

## Supply List for Hypertufa Class at Northland Rosarium

Please pay your \$15.00 class fee at the sales house when you arrive.

Hi and welcome to our Hypertufa Class at Northland Rosarium; July 31, 2010 9am (sharp). We want to provide you with some tips and what to expect so there aren't any unpleasant surprises. First of all, this class has 20 students and is full so **Please call us ASAP if you are unable to attend as we have a waiting list of people who wanted to take this class! [(509) 448-4968]**

You will be actually making a Hypertufa project, not just observing so be sure to wear old, comfortable clothes that you don't mind getting dirty in. Some standing may be required, so comfortable shoes are recommended. We will try to work in a shady area so that you and the Hypertufa don't get too hot, but just in case, sunglasses, sunscreen, and a hat might be a good idea.

***This class should be about 2 hours (9am-11am or so...) Water and snacks will be provided but lunch is on your own should your project take longer.***

Hypertufa is a mix of Portland cement and other elements that help it remain lighter than concrete (don't worry, we'll give you some actual recipes and how to mix them). The texture and consistency is like mud so it can be shaped somewhat and left to dry. **We will be providing a 2'x2' board** for you to work on and carry your project home, so have a project in mind that will fit on the board. **Rubber or latex gloves** are a good idea as the cement can be a bit harsh on the hands.

**You can bring small, cardboard boxes, old plastic bowls or containers, rubber balls, leaves from your garden (rhubarb and hosta leaves are great) basically anything that is disposable and flexible so it will act as a mold and then release your project.** Don't stress if you haven't a clue what you're going to make. We'll give you lots of ideas and ways to paint the projects to go with your garden décor. (Actual painting of your project cannot be done for 28 days after it is thoroughly dry so be patient...)

**Do bring any decorative bling you'd like to add to your project** e.g. Marbles, small pebbles, rocks, beads, metal charms, chains or bits of whimsy; basically anything that will last outdoors in the garden. Twigs and branches are cool, but don't expect them to last as long as the hypertufa will. Be creative and remember this is a craft class, not an art class so you won't be judged!!!
